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United Way reviews submissions based upon past grant performance, proposed impact goals that fit within our priority areas, and the financial stability of the organization.



EXPERTS

Review panels of subject matter experts and people with lived experience assist in understanding community needs, program overlap and gaps



5. **APPROVE**

Final recommendations are brought forward to United Way's Board of Directors for approval.

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ACCOUNTABILITY

Funding is granted on a one, two, or three year basis. Programs are reviewed annually. Our process includes an analysis of program outcomes, financial reporting and site visits.

Last year 12,848 seniors accessed programs that combatted isolation by engaging them in social groups, offering volunteer services and rides to important appointments, supporting post-hospital care, addressing the challenges of Alzheimers and dementia, matching them with affordable hearing aids, and making a substantial impact on their lives and those of their loved ones and caregivers.
